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*Hail To The Chief?*

After 3 articles critiquing/berating Donald Trump (losing 2 readers), with others asking why I even voted for him, another article is needed to address where I'm coming from.

I voted for Trump because 4 more years of the left would have handed us over to some version of WEF/UN/EU, 1-world globalism, which would have marked an end for any possibility of survival for the republic, a stripping of liberty, and feudal servitude.

I am forever grateful to Donald Trump as the sole force that offed the left. A *left* that used to represent anti-war that lately surpassed a warmongering *right* as the greatest threat to world peace. Trump exposed the Biden/Obama legacy for what it is: Biden a decades old warmonger without concern for the Bill of Rights. And Obama—a fascist.

Trump is a brave man. Knocked around for his 1st 4 years, by a coordinated, hidden agenda, then subjected to *criminality* from the *deep state left*, that sunk to lower depths than anything in American History. But he was not deterred, fighting lawsuits where the criminality was to be found in the charges brought rather than in the person charged.

Along the way, he dealt with *assassination attempts of the week*—orchestrated by the same mentality that did in JFK/Bobby. Again he was not deterred. Americans need to honor him for rising up off a stage to continue a fight from which he did not retreat.

President Trump needs to be reminded that, along with any vengefulness he feels for the way he has been battered, next to his deep-seated nationalism (which I greatly respect), what will set him apart from the left will be an adherence to the Constitution.

He has to be reminded, by each of us, that the Bill of Rights comes before any personal ideology, requiring him to speak out against police, with no concern for due

process, taking the assets of American citizens without any necessity of bring charges.

He needs to view student protests as vital to the republic: miscarriages of human decency such as Vietnam were only stopped because of young American courage. Protests in reaction to genocide are a vital expression of free/open debate. For a president to suggest shooting protestors represents a debt to Zionism—he does not owe.

Trump is someone who likes to be liked. Caring about how he's viewed by his fellows, those he respects, can keep him from following dictates of his huge personality.

My biggest concern for President Trump (other than inability to view Zionism for what it really is), is that he is not a good judge of character. Let me explain. For his 1st administration he chose Bolton/Pompeo as national security advisors. If he did that to appease others—it was a bad choice. If he did it using his own judgement—even worse.

Among my colleagues, is a shared view that his nominees are not what we hoped for. They were chosen, not for any diplomatic acumen, instead, as Zionists or loyal MAGA supporters. But, isn't that like Biden's SC pick needing to be a black woman?

Sending general Kellogg to Ukraine, who knows nothing about Russia, and is an Iran hawk, will do nothing to bring a desired peace with Russia. Pete Hegseth, as Secretary of Defense, gets rid of the Milley/Austin contingent that are but a bi-product of trans/DEI. Hegseth would transform the military into the loyal killing machine—it needs to be.

Somebody susceptible to influence such as Trump needs a deliberate, slow to action, military head. There were better choices for Pentagon—such as Col. Doug MacGregor.

It's obvious that Trump is not listening in to his friend's show, *Judging Freedom*, Judge Andrew Napolitano, with the best array of strategic minds—made obvious by its subscribers of more than 500,000. Most anybody on there would be a better choice.

My concern for the President: his discernment for what is needed to bring diplomatic peace to the world is lacking. And without that, he is incapable of selecting national security advisers who understand who and what is needed to rectify US foreign Policy .

Because of that I fear, even with good intentions, the President runs a risk of making things worse than better. If someone doesn't understand the rules of the game, how can they be expected to play the game? Hopefully, he will get on well with Putin/Xi. And, in that process, understand what he needs to abandon to have a legacy of peace.
