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*Make America Great Again—What's the Real Plan?*

JD Vance warns Israel to not hinder Trump's attempt to extricate himself from the Iran debacle, but, with a closer look, peace with Iran is in jeopardy.

The way Vance/Trump deal with Iran reminds me of an 8th grade bully cajoling/threatening a 6th grader out of his lunch money. Everything in the 14 points that calls for American concessions is being put off—all to be decided by committee as the (non) cease-fire progresses. Jared Kushner is to decide how much of Iran's stolen assets will be returned—and when. But first, Kushner takes his cut off the top?

Lest we forget, Vance is running for president, appeasing everyone to that end. He's appeasing some who actually seek peace, but like Tulsi Gabbard, Vance proceeds (*keeping the change in his socks*), looking to his future benefit.
